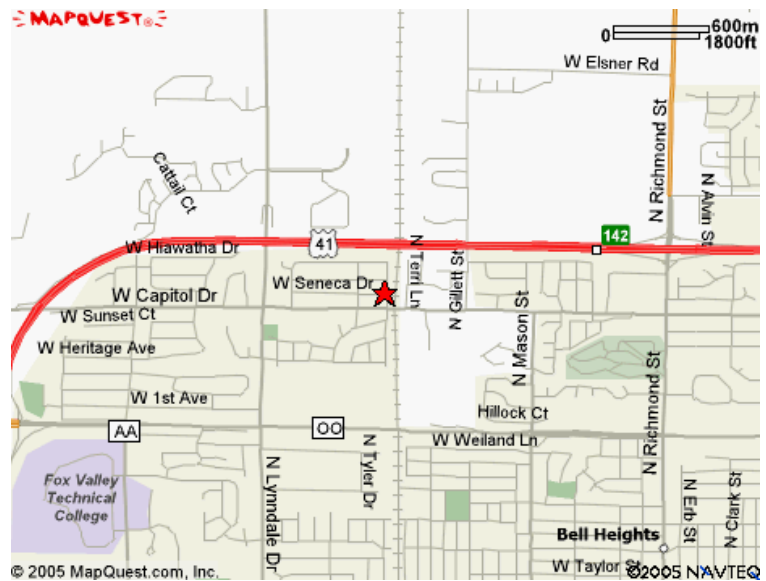

WHAT AM I? By BRUCE ABRAHAM

I am a native Wisconsin plant, deciduous, of the Family **Ulmaceae**; Genus **Celtis**. My habitat is moist to dry, typically found in: Southern Lowland and Southern Upland Forests; in addition, I am very drought tolerant and survive quite well in limestone soils. I mature at a height of 30' to 50' and have very ridged, scaly, gray-colored bark. My leaves are ovate and about 3" long, alternate and sharply serrate - green above and paler below, turning yellow in autumn. I bloom with smallish green flowers, in small clusters or as a single bloom, in late May and bear edible fruit in September/October that can remain on me until spring. My fruit, dark red to purple, is called a drupe - similar to a cherry with fleshy fruit with a hard inner layer around a seed - is particularly desired by birds, including cardinals.

What happens when you till the soil?

Why do you till your garden beds year after year? Is it because you've always done it? Because your mother or dad always did it? Because it just looks nicer?

Many experts agree that the less tilling the better. While tilling can destroy weeds, it can also cause more weeds by breaking their roots into tiny pieces, each of which will sprout on its own. Tilling also lays the soil bare to weed seeds which are eager to germinate. Weeds are pioneer plants which have evolved over millions of years to quickly cover disturbed open ground.

Tilling fluffs up the soil, which looks nice, but while doing so it provides air to soil microbes that become metabolically supercharged and release a flood of nutrients for fast crop growth. That may sound great, but those revved-up microbes will burn up all the nutrients and then die, actually depleting the soil's fertility. The more the soil is disturbed, the more quickly its organic matter decomposes and the more often it needs to be replenished.

Bare, newly tilled soil is susceptible to the impact of rain. A hard spring rain can pound on the soil and either compact it or wash it away.

Power tillers shred and kill thousands of beneficial earthworms. You may have heard that cutting a worm in half results in two worms, but that is not true. Only the head can survive and regenerate a body, but it probably can't survive shredding or tearing.

Try to avoid tilling unless your garden soil is extremely compacted or is hard clay that needs to be mixed with a topping of organic matter. If you must turn over the soil, it is better to do it gently with a spade than with a power tiller. If you have good loose soil, but still want the neater look, use your hoe to fluff up the top inch or so.

Not only will you save yourself some work by avoiding tilling, you'll be doing your plants and the environment a favor too.

Gardening Tips

There are certain annuals that may tend to do better in some locations than others. Proper plant selection can provide cool weather color, brighten a shady spot, dress up a hot dry location or accent an open sunny area.

Shady Location: Rare is the plant that will flower in heavy shade, but many do well with four hours or less of direct sunlight. Plants must often compete with trees and shrubs for moisture and nutrients. If the shade is due to structures, proper plant selection is important. Here are a few suggested plants for shade areas. For very heavy shade select impatiens,

begonia, coleus, browallia, fuchsia and torenia. For light shade, lobelia, nicotiana, red salvia, pansy, alyssum, dusty miller, impatiens, begonia, and ageratum are suggested.

Sunny Location: Hot and dry areas are common along the edges of pavement or in front of light colored, south facing walls. Intense heat dries the ground quickly and tests the staying power of most annuals. Protect plants in these locations with a thick mulch and water thoroughly. Here are some plants that do well in hot dry areas: celosia, vinca, gazania, blue salvia, zinnia, verbena, portulaca, dusty miller, petunia, and strawflower.

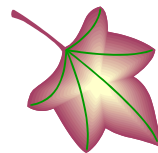

Slug Search!

Hello, I am working on my PhD at Old Dominion University in Norfolk, Virginia. As part of my dissertation project, I am mapping the distribution of slug species in eastern North America.

Background

There are three native and 13 exotic slug species documented from eastern United States and Canada. Unfortunately, very little is known about the distribution (let alone the ecology and biology) of these small mollusks. Since so many of the slugs were introduced from Europe, it is difficult to know how far north they have been able to spread and just what they are eating. An understanding of the distribution of these different slugs will provide valuable information to both biologists and agriculturists.

What you can do

I would like to document slugs by county across the eastern United States and Canada. You can help by e-mailing me digital pictures of slugs you find. The following information would be very helpful:

- **A picture or two of the slug (top view and side view would be best). If possible, include a quarter in the picture to help me determine how big the slugs are.**
- **What county and state did you find the slug in?**
- **Did you find the slug outside or in a greenhouse?**
- **What was the slug on (a plant, under a log, etc.)?**
- **If known, what type of plant was the slug on?**
- **Please e-mail to slugsearch@yahoo.com.**

By sending pictures and answering the above questions, you will provide invaluable distribution data, which will be available through publications and/or websites in the future. Your cooperation will also allow me to direct my research for the next couple of years.

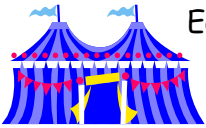
