Community garden programs are one of the major volunteer projects MGVs participate in across the state. Well-structured programs blend support service, community education and youth education aspects. The produce grown in projects is often donated to food pantries or harvested directly by the families that need it most. For many of these gardens, we know these are very personal projects taken on by MGVs.

Traditional advanced training in the past has been heavily focused on the "content" associated with growing fruits and vegetables in the state. This season's training attempts to continue this with but with an emphasis on the selection and culture of many popular fruits and vegetables grown in Wisconsin. We also will introduce new topics that connect MGVs to concepts of local food systems and food insecurity in Wisconsin, safe handling practices for both in the field and out, and addressing both conventional and organic growing methods. Our hope is this series will build upon your knowledge of fruit and vegetable gardening and reinforce your potential role as a MGV addressing food security issues in our individual communities.

2012 Annual Accomplishment Report

The UW-Extension office just received the full 2012 Annual Accomplishment Report of the University of Wisconsin Extension Master Gardener Program. The full report is available online at: <http://wimastergardener.org/?q=Accomplishments> or you can stop in the Master Gardener area at the office and take a look. It provides a great amount of detail about county and statewide projects and has one-page summaries of each local association's annual activities.

In the state, there are 2,863 volunteers who were certified or recertified for 2013. There are approximately 745 MGVs trained in 2012 through counties around the state that are now working towards completing their initial volunteerism. All total, 200,440 hours of volunteer service was performed by MGVs around the state. 12,883 hours were in Youth Education, 35,017 hours were in Community Education, and 152,539 hours were in Support Services. The average volunteer gives 65 hours of service annually. In addition, MGVs also participated in 67,094 hours of continuing education hours.

You all can be proud to know that Winnebago County contributed to the 4th highest local association volunteer hours in Wisconsin. Only Milwaukee, Dane, and Outagamie Counties had more. Once again, your youth and community education volunteerism is much more than typical. Thank you again for another year of helping the people of Winnebago County become better educated in horticulture and making our communities more beautiful one project at a time.

As we move into the New Year, take time to look back over the year and be proud of everything you all have accomplished. And here's to another year full of wonderful and exciting horticulture activities for everyone to enjoy.

The oldest trees in the world are thought to be Bristlecone Pine trees, which are considered the strongest living organisms on earth and having survived the harshest conditions. The Prometheus Tree, a Great Basin Bristlecone Pine located in Nevada, is approximately 5000 years old - already old when the Egyptians were building the pyramids. Similar in age is another Bristlecone Pine nicknamed Methuselah and located in California's White Mountains.

What Am I ??

I am a deciduous shrub in a genus containing 70-75 species of flowering plants native to the Americas as well as southern and eastern Asia.

I can add winter interest to your garden in addition to stunning white flowers in summer, blooming every year even after intensely cold winters. I am hardy in zones 4 to 9, preferring sun to part shade and moist, well-drained soil.

I should be watered regularly and mulched to keep soil from becoming dry. My height is 3 to 4 feet and my width 3 to 5 feet. My 8 to 12 inch, sterile flowers appear in symmetrical, rounded heads (corymbs), blooming in June for up to two months.

My leaves are opposite, simple, serrate, dark green and 3 to 7 inches long.

Answer to..... What Am I?

I am a hydrangea. Order: Rosales. Family: Hydrangeaceae – Hydrangea family. Genus: Hydrangea L – hydrangea. Species: Hydrangea arborescens L – wild hydrangea. Common name: Annabelle hydrangea. Annabelle is the best known variety of Hydrangea arborescens. Until recently this was the only arborescens easy to find but scientists have recently developed new varieties. Hydrangeas are moderately toxic if eaten, with all parts of the plant containing cyanogenic glycosides.

Christmas trees from the grocery store



This time of year just about every grocery, department and drug store features a beautiful display of live miniature Christmas trees as soon as you walk in the door. They are beautiful, healthy-looking trees and include Norfolk Island pines, various cypresses, holly and rosemary. After they've served their purpose as winter decoration, many people hope to plant them outdoors next spring. Most of these plants will not survive outdoors in Wisconsin, but a few of them might.

Norfolk Island is in the South Pacific between Australia and New Zealand – trees born there cannot handle Wisconsin winters. They do make wonderful houseplants though, if given proper conditions. A bright, cool location with daytime temperatures ranging from 60°-70° with slightly cooler nighttime temps is ideal. A few hours of direct sunlight daily is best although they will survive with bright, indirect light. The plant will grow toward the light, so give it a quarter turn occasionally to keep it growing straight.

When the top inch of the soil feels dry, water the Norfolk pine thoroughly until water runs out the bottom of the pot. Do not allow the plant to sit in the drained water. There's no need to fertilize in winter; during the growing season feed it with an indoor foliage plant food.

The challenge in growing Norfolk Island pines is lack of humidity indoors. They thrive at 50% humidity, but most homes have much lower indoor humidity in winter. A humidifier or daily misting will keep the plant much happier.

It is normal for a few needles on lower branches to turn brown and drop. If it becomes widespread, the problem may be too much or too little water, too hot or too cold temperature or too low humidity.

There are several different cypresses sold in stores for Christmas decorations. Few of them list their Latin names so it is hard to research whether or not they will survive our winters. Reading the tag might or might not help. Some tags say "hardy." Some don't say anything at all about cold hardiness. Both probably mean the plant won't make it here. One cypress widely sold lists survival in USDA hardiness zones 5-8. That one might survive outdoors here. The tags also say that the needles may turn brown under the winter sun, and yes, they will. The tree will look dead, but the next year will green up just fine.

For the most part, the cypresses for sale in our local stores come from Florida or the Pacific Northwest. Even if labeled hardy for Wisconsin winters, they have never actually experienced one and cannot be counted on to survive.

The rosemary in the holiday displays can grow outdoors in summer but must be brought inside for winter. As for the hollies, with no Latin name listed, who knows?

I'm not saying you shouldn't buy these gorgeous little trees. I'm just saying don't count on them as part of your permanent outdoor landscape.
